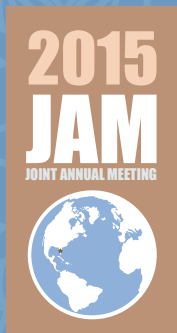

The American Dairy Science Association® (ADSA®) and American Society of Animal Science (ASAS) will hold our 2015 Joint Annual Meeting (JAM) in Orlando, Florida, July 12–16, immediately following the 2015 Interbull annual meeting being held at the same location (July 9–12). JAM Welcomes Interbull to Orlando!

The 2015 Interbull Annual Meeting will take place July 9–12, 2015, at the Rosen Shingle Creek Resort in Orlando, Florida, on the four days leading up to the start of the 2015 ADSA®-ASAS JAM. Interbull is a subcommittee of ICAR and is completing 32 years of existence in 2015. Interbull includes 50 organizations from 32 countries on 5 continents, who participate in Interbull activities involving international genetic evaluations of dairy bulls (83 populations from 6 breeds, delivering about 200,000 evaluations for 40 different traits, 3 times a year).

A separate registration fee is required to attend the full Interbull Annual Meeting, and a special student rate is available. Those interested in attending can add Interbull registration to their JAM registration or can register for the Interbull meeting only (see page 13). The Interbull registration fee includes morning coffee, lunch, and afternoon coffee on Friday, July 10; and morning coffee, lunch, afternoon coffee, and dinner on Saturday, July 11. Interbull scientific sessions run all day Friday and Saturday morning, with steering/technical committee and business meetings on Thursday, July 9, and Saturday afternoon. Presentation Information

Notice to Nonmember Presenters

Because of an increase in no-shows for both oral and poster presentations at recent meetings, if you are not a member of ADSA or ASAS, acceptance of your abstract for the 2015 JAM will be finalized only if you have registered for the meeting by **April 1, 2015**.

General Meeting Information continued

If, for any reason, you cannot attend after you have preregistered, you must arrange for a co-author to make your oral presentation. Once you've made alternative arrangements, please contact JAM headquarters (abstract@assochq.org) to provide the new presenter information.

If an abstract is accepted, the presenter must attend the meeting to present (this applies to both oral and poster presentations). If a nonmember presenter (i.e., not a member of ADSA or ASAS) is not registered for the 2015 Joint Annual Meeting by 11:59 pm (Central time) on **April 1, 2015**, the abstract will not be published. It will be removed from the program and will no longer be available for presentation at the meeting. Nonmembers who register but cannot attend the meeting and are unable to arrange for a substitute presenter will receive a 90% refund, provided the reason for nonattendance is a personal emergency. If nonattendance is due to visa denial, a 50% refund shall be made. All nonmember presenter requests for refunds must be accompanied by appropriate documentation and will be processed after the meeting in the form in which registration payment was made (i.e., if you paid by credit card, the refund will be applied to your credit card account). If you cannot attend but do arrange for a co-author to make your oral presentation, please contact JAM headquarters (abstract@assochq.org) to provide your change of information.

Oral sessions will begin at 9:30 am on Monday and Tuesday, 10:30 am on Wednesday, and 8:30 am on Thursday. Meeting rooms will be equipped for electronic presentations and pre-loaded sessions.

Upload Information

Pre-meeting upload: Presenters will be able to upload presentation files in advance of the meeting. Avoid the onsite rush and upload your presentation on your own schedule. The website is available 24 hours a day from now until 11:59 pm (Central time) on July 8: <http://www.fass-abstracts.org/meetinginfo.asp?meetingcode=229>. **Files will not be accepted via e-mail.**

Onsite upload: Onsite presentation upload will be available; files can be delivered to the Preload Room. Presentations must be uploaded by 3:00 pm on the day **before** your scheduled presentation. Files will not be accepted via e-mail. **No presentations will be loaded while the session is in progress or between presentations.**

Poster Presentations

We have dedicated a two-hour block each morning to poster presentations. The "open poster" sessions will be from 7:30 to 9:30 am Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday in the Gatlin Ballroom of the Rosen Shingle Creek. Coffee and pastries will be served in the poster area from 8:00 to 9:00 am on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday.

Each poster presentation will be available for public viewing for the entire day, with the presenting authors present during the open posters time (7:30–9:30 am). All posters must be mounted on the board 30 minutes before the beginning of the day's session (**posters must be mounted on boards by 7:00 am**). The exhibit hall will open at 6:30 am, Monday through Wednesday. **Posters must be removed after 5:00 pm each day.** Any posters remaining after 5:30 pm will be discarded.

Each poster board area is 48 inches high and 96 inches wide. Use of this space is dictated by the presenter, with the following exceptions: the top of the poster space must include the abstract number with the corresponding letter of the day it is being presented, title, authors, and affiliations. The lettering for this section should be at least 1 inch high.

Locating the Correct Poster Board

Each poster board number corresponds to the abstract number as noted in the program. For Monday posters an "M"; Tuesday posters a "T"; and for Wednesday posters a "W" precedes the board number.

Notice to Attendees

Use of cameras, video cameras, and phones (for calls or audio/video recording) is prohibited during oral and poster presentations to minimize disruption and unauthorized dissemination of data. Anyone found in violation of this policy will be asked to leave the session. Smartphones may be used in the poster area to access the JAM poster app via QR code.

Media Room

Orlando Transportation

Orlando International Airport serves more than 35 scheduled airlines, providing nonstop service from more than 100 US domestic and international cities. Once in Orlando, you can choose from a large selection of rental vehicles, taxis, limousines,

and public transportation. Travel by car is also convenient, with a number of major highways flowing into Central Florida and throughout the rest of the state. JAM attendees who choose to drive to the meeting will enjoy free overnight self-parking; a discounted parking rate of \$5/day is available for JAM attendees not staying at the Rosen Shingle Creek. Attendees traveling around International Drive can board the I-Ride Trolley, a hop-on, hop-off service route exclusive to the International Drive Resort area. Orlando's public transportation system, LYNX, is a great way to get around town.

The Rosen Shingle Creek Resort is approximately 11 miles from Orlando International Airport (MCO). The one-way taxi fare from the airport to the resort is approximately \$45.00. Workshops

Teaching Workshop: Changing the animal science teaching and learning paradigm—An interactive workshop on how to use case study teaching to foster critical thinking and classroom discussion (separate fee required)

The purpose of this workshop is to engage participants in different types of case study methods of instruction, demonstrate how to teach with case studies and how to write cases and teaching notes so that other individuals can use them. During this highly interactive workshop, participants will experience case study teaching from the student's viewpoint and discuss how this teaching method can contribute to critical thinking and effective classroom discussions. In breakout sessions, participants will write their own cases or modify existing cases relevant to specific disciplines within the animal sciences undergraduate program (e.g., nutrition, genetics, management, physiology). This daylong workshop will be facilitated by Dr. Clyde (Kipp) Herreid, who is the founding director of the National Center for Case Study Teaching in Science (<http://sciencecases.lib.buffalo.edu/cs/>) and distinguished teaching professor of the State University of New York. Kipp has published over 150 articles and five books in the fields of ecology, behavior, and physiology of animals and has written extensively in the field of science education.
